Higher risk areas of the building			
Some areas of the church building may present a higher risk than others; for example toilets and restrooms.	<p>Heavily used areas of the building are more likely to present an infection transmission risk</p> <p>Toilets are essential for members, volunteers and visitors to wash their hands regularly but also the toilets must be kept clean and free of coronavirus contamination</p> <p>A number of people going to the toilet together may compromise their ability to comply with physical distancing</p> <p>Increased risk of people coughing and touching door handles, taps and toilet flush handles</p>	<p>Ensure higher-risk/ high-traffic areas of the building are effectively controlled by applying appropriate safety precautions, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • stressing the need for everyone to follow good hygiene practice at all times (i.e. regular handwashing, using tissues and disposing of them appropriately, etc) • the congregation will ensure that adequate hand-cleaning resources are provided; all toilets to be supplied with adequate supplies of hot water, liquid soap and paper towels • printing handwashing instructions/posters and displaying throughout the building, especially in toilets • limiting numbers of people who can use high traffic areas such as corridors, stairs, toilets and restrooms at any one time to ensure physical distancing • limiting lift occupancy • monitor high-traffic area use and regulate access as necessary • prioritise disabled use where necessary, e.g. disabled toilet use, use of lifts, etc 	<p>Notices will be in place at all entrances and throughout the building reminding everyone of controls in place.</p> <p>All doors wedged open during entrance and exit time to ensure no one has to touch the doors or handles. 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REVIEW

This risk assessment must be kept under constant review as we move through the different phases of the Scottish Government's four-stage approach to easing the Covid-19 restrictions. It is recommended that this risk assessment be reviewed at least monthly or before moving on to a different phase of the plan. A note of the review date and any amendments should be recorded and retained by the congregation.
